



Things To See and Do | Glasgow

Kelvingrove Art Gallery

Kelvingrove Museum opened in 1901 and is a firm favourite with local people and visitors. It has stunning architecture, a friendly atmosphere and contains 22 galleries where you can discover everything from art to animals.

Necropolis

The Glasgow Necropolis is a Victorian garden cemetery beside Glasgow Cathedral. Inspired by Paris's Père-Lachaise, it features stunning Classical Revival monuments. With 50,000 burials, it offers rich history and architecture.

Glasgow Cathedral

Built around the 12th century, Glasgow Cathedral acted as the seat of the Bishop and the Archbishop of Glasgow, it's a superb example of Scottish Gothic architecture.

Glasgow Botanic Gardens

Glasgow Botanic Gardens, in the city's vibrant West End, features 20 hectares of stunning grounds along the River Kelvin, including glasshouses like the iconic Kibble Palace, home to tropical plants and tree ferns. Explore diverse flora, riverside walks and a cosy tearoom.

City Chambers

An eminent example of Victorian civic architecture, the building was constructed between 1882 and 1888 and has served as the headquarters of Glasgow City Council since 1996.

Riverside Museum

The Riverside Museum, designed by Dame Zaha Hadid, is Glasgow's award-winning transport & technology museum. It showcases 3,000+ exhibits, from vintage vehicles to recreated historic streets. Highlights include interactive displays and the Tall Ship, Glenlee.

Clyde Distillery

The Clydeside Distillery, Glasgow's first dedicated single malt distillery in over 100 years, blends tradition and modernity on the historic docks of the Clyde. Enjoy tours revealing whisky's local roots, expert-led tastings of three drams and a specialist whisky shop.

Wellpark Brewery

Wellpark Brewery, Glasgow, blends 450+ years of brewing heritage with modern passion. Tour the home of Tennent's Lager, explore its rich history, and enjoy a taste of Scotland's favourite beer.

George Square

George Square is the principal civic square in the city of Glasgow, Scotland. It's named after King George III. Laid out in 1781, George Square is surrounded by architecturally important buildings.



Pollok Country Park

Pollok Country Park, Glasgow's largest and only Country Park, offers 361 acres of woodlands, gardens, and riverside walks. Once part of the Maxwell family's estate, it's home to Highland cattle, the Burrell Collection and Pollok House. Named Britain's Best Park (2007) and Europe's Best Park (2008), it's a peaceful retreat with trails, wildlife and history to explore.

Glasgow Tower

Glasgow Tower, part of Glasgow Science Centre, offers 360° rotating views at 127m high. Scotland's tallest building and a Guinness World Record holder, it's a feat of engineering and panoramic beauty.



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
