The Tyne Bridges

One of Newcastle's most iconic landmarks, the Tyne Bridge connects the city to Gateshead across the River Tyne. Completed in 1928 and opened by King George V, it spans 389 meters and stands 59 meters high. Inspired by Sydney Harbour Bridge, it originally featured tramlines, which were removed in the 1950s, though some remnants remain.



Great North Museum: Hancock

A must-see in Newcastle, offering a blend of natural history, archaeology and world cultures. Home to the only surviving example of Kurt Schwitters' Merzbau, the museum also boasts impressive collections of Egyptian artefacts, African sculptures and a variety of temporary exhibitions.

The Victoria Tunnel

Venture underground into the Victoria Tunnel, a preserved 19th-century waggonway running beneath Newcastle from the Town Moor to the River Tyne. Originally built to transport coal, it later sheltered thousands during World War II. Today, guided tours reveal its fascinating history and eerie passageways.



Newcastle Castle

A historic fortress in the heart of the city, this 12th-century landmark features the well-preserved Newcastle Castle Keep and the Black Gate, which once served as its main entrance. Visitors can explore its rich history, enjoy stunning views from the top and discover its significant role in the development of Newcastle.

The Laing Art Gallery

Explore the Laing Art Gallery which showcases an exceptional collection of British paintings, sculptures and decorative arts. Highlights include works by Gauguin, John Martin, and 20th-century British artists like Stanley Spencer and Henry Moore, with ever-changing exhibitions to excite every art lover.

Jesmond Dene

A peaceful woodland escape in Newcastle, this scenic valley follows the River Ouseburn, creating a vital wildlife corridor. Home to kingfishers, red squirrels and woodland birds, it also features picturesque bridges, winding paths and historic 19th-century landscape design.
